## Principal's Report

Tēnā koutou

With the completion of Year 9 enrolments for 2017, we have recently fitted the students with their new uniform. The response was extremely positive and the students all had big smiles as they were fitted. The new uniforms will be delivered to families later in the year. In 2017 the new school uniform will be for sale at our new onsite Uniform Shop. The existing uniform will still be available at our current suppliers.

Many of you will have observed the containers and the fencing around the site of the new six-classroom build. This is due to start very shortly and will give us an additional six teaching spaces as well as two break-out spaces and a staff resource room. Three of the teaching spaces are "single-cell" classrooms and the remaining spaces are open plan. Currently our teachers work in a variety of spaces in the school to suit their teaching styles and the options for co-teaching and collaboration will be enhanced with these new spaces. The new spaces can't come fast enough as we are extremely short of classrooms. They will also serve us well for meeting spaces for evening parent meetings and other school functions. Plans are underway for a new Careers Hub which will be a space dedicated to our careers and tutoring staff – this space will enable students to browse for careers information more freely and seek advice and guidance from our Tutors and Careers Advisor.

The senior students should all be focused on their upcoming examinations and are reminded of our school goals – "aim high and be the very best you can be". The practice examination results will be available on the school portal and parents and students are encouraged to check the results as they become available.

### **Key Dates for Senior Students**

**Year 13:** The last day for Year 13 is Wednesday, November 2. The Graduation Ceremony takes place on the evening of Friday, November 4.

**Year 12:** The last day of school before exam leave for Year 12 will be Thursday, November 3.

**Year 11:** The last day of school before exam leave is Thursday, November 3.

**Note:** The exam admission slips will be distributed to Year 11 to 13 students during the week prior to their departure. These slips are required for entry into the exam rooms.

### **Reader/Writer Volunteers Needed**

We have students at all levels, including those doing NCEA, who qualify to have special assistance with assessments due to a learning disability. This assistance takes the form of someone assisting them with their reading and/or writing.

We are looking for members of our community who are willing to volunteer their time to provide this assistance. They would need to be available during the school day and training would be provided. In terms of time involved that is up to the volunteer as to how much they would be available. No subject knowledge is needed as it is strictly a matter of reading the questions and writing down what the student says. ### **Whooping Cough**

Over the last couple of weeks some students have been diagnosed as having whooping cough. The following information is from the Canterbury District Health Board.

Parents should check their child's immunisations are up to date. Vaccinations are given as part of the National Childhood Immunisation Schedule at the ages of 6 weeks, 3 months, 5 months, 4 years and 11 years.

If any of the symptoms are noticed – be cautious and consult a GP advising the practice of the possibility of whooping cough. The infectious period is from the early stage of symptoms until 3 weeks after the onset of the cough (or until 5 days if a course of antibiotics has been completed).

## **NZQA App for NCEA students**

The following information is a reminder from NZQA.

NZQA has developed a mobile App called NCEA Student to help students plan their NCEA study programme, set goals and track their progress. The free App is available from the [iTunes](#) and [Google Play stores](#).

### **What does the App do?**

Students were involved in the design of the App from the beginning, and chose the functions that were of most value to them. Functionality provides students with the ability to:

- Select and set their NCEA credit goals and targets
- See how they are tracking towards NCEA Levels One, Two and Three, including Literacy, Numeracy and University Entrance (UE)
- Set reminders for each standard such as when assignments are due
- Capture results as they are achieved and cross check with the school or NZQA
- Personalise with information such as NSN number or details about a course or standard (such as the teacher's name or timetabled classroom)
- Customise with different colour coding options and the ability to add photos
- Use in English and Te Reo Māori.

**SOLO for parents and caregivers** - what am I learning, how is it going and what do I do next?

A great deal of our reporting at Year 9 and 10 uses SOLO Taxonomy, a model of surface and deep learning developed by Biggs and Collis in 1982. Here is a brief overview of how SOLO is used as a common language of learning at Lincoln High School. This will help you to understand your child's learning.

### WHAT and WHY






The classroom based use of SOLO is an approach developed by Pam Hook to make learning visible to students, and support them to deepen their learning. Pam Hook works closely with Lincoln High School to further develop SOLO for our students. SOLO is used to both design learning tasks and assess student learning outcomes. The power of SOLO is that it makes it clear to students where they are at, and what they need to do to their work to show a deeper level of learning. With SOLO the focus is on the complexity of the student response, and how it might be improved, rather than on labelling the student.

SOLO is also used in NCEA to distinguish between Achieved, Merit and Excellence.

### Understanding SOLO levels

When students' learning is assessed according to SOLO, the learning outcome will be at one of the 5 levels below. Here is a brief explanation of what each level means.

SOLO can either be declarative (describing – usually writing or talking about knowledge) or functional (usually demonstrating a skill).

Year 13 students applying for courses with other tertiary providers: students going on to further study are currently enrolling and using their Principal's reference to apply for scholarships. There will be further opportunities coming and students need to keep checking to see what is on offer.

Planning for next year: students still wanting assistance with this are encouraged to make an appointment with their Tutor or with the Careers Advisor.

Revision for the practice exams is critical at this time. Good time management and study habits will ensure good results. Students are reminded of the importance of practice exams in terms of providing a derived grade should one be needed if the actual exam cannot be completed due to injury or some other unforeseen event.

Employment opportunities are coming into the school and interested students are encouraged to check information available from Student Services.

### **Studylink Information for Students**

Studylink is a service of the Ministry of Social Development, administering Student Allowances, Student Loans, and assisting students to get the finance and support they are entitled to. First time students will need a RealMe login or RealMe Verified Identity, their IRD number, their bank account details, their email address, the name of the education provider where they will be studying, and approximate course start and end dates. By applying early, students will allow enough time for all steps in the application process to be completed before their course starts. ## Screenagers: Living Online

### TV programme with Nigel Latta

Many young people are using technology wisely for learning and to keep in touch with the world. A lot of research is being done, but there is little evidence of harmful effects as yet.

However, some NZ research findings are concerning -

- **Sexting** – 1 in 3 young women think that sexting is expected if they are in a relationship. 50% have been asked for a sexual image and 38% have sent a sexual image.
- **Pornography** – 61% of teens are getting sexual information from the internet and half of this is pornography.
- **Cyberbullying** – 1 in 5 have experienced negative cyberbullying. Compared to other bullying cyberbullying allows no place to get away from it. It is relentless and follows the young person 24/7.
- **Sexual offenders** have easy access to information about, and contact with, young people.

### Helpful messages

- Keep technology out of the bedroom – the concerning part of their on-line world is often secretive. This is one of a parent/caregiver's best ways of keeping a barrier between the young person and the outside world. Leave technology in the living area at night to allow them to have a better sleep, a rest from their online world and less chance of being involved in worrying content and conversations.
- Don't let the internet educate your young person about sexual relationships and how to treat people.
- Guide your young person. Talk to them about your concerns especially about the topics above. Listen to their concerns and what is happening in their online world.
- Check Netsafe [www.netsafe.org.nz](http://www.netsafe.org.nz) for privacy settings and other ideas about staying safe on the internet.

## Encouraging lifelong readers

Scholastic is sharing tips culled from four countries that can [help children everywhere become lifelong readers](#). Compiled from data gathered for the [Kids & Family Reading Report](#) U.S., U.K., Australia, and India editions, the survey of children and their parents revealed four key, actionable themes. In each country, at least 1,000 parents of children ages 0–17 and at least 695 children ages 6–17 were surveyed. An infographic to share with parents is available for [download](#).

The report reveals that, on average, only one in three kids read books for fun five or more days a week. The four ways that parents and caregivers can help kids discover the power and joy of reading are listed below.

1. **Let children choose their books:** About 9 in 10 children ages 6–17 say they are more likely to finish reading a book that “I have picked out myself” (90% U.S., 89% Australia, 86% India, and 84% U.K.).
2. **Continue to read aloud—and often:** Children ages 6–17 reported they love (or loved) read aloud time at home (86% Australia, 85% India, 83% U.S., and 83% U.K.) and the top reason was “it’s a special time with my parent.” While parents often stop reading aloud at age six, many kids ages 6–11 who were read to at home wanted reading aloud to continue (57% India, 40% U.S., 36% Australia, and 31% U.K.).
3. **Be a reading role model:** In each country, a powerful predictor of kids’ reading frequency is having a parent who personally reads and/or reads aloud to their child five or more days a week.
4. **Find funny reads:** “Make me laugh” is the top criteria kids look for when picking out a book to read for fun (70% U.S., 63% U.K., 62% India, and 61% Australia).

“Giving kids the chance to find the books *they* want to read is crucial to helping them associate reading with fun,” said Dav Pilkey, international bestselling creator of the “Captain Underpants” series and the new “Dog Man” graphic novel series in a press release. “Choice is important because it is what changed me to become a lifelong reader.”
