

Principal's Report

Our Community of Learning Kāhui Ako, Ngā Mātāpuna o Ngā Pākihi, is entering a new phase as our achievement challenges were recently endorsed by the Secretary of Education. This means we will begin the process of appointing across school teacher roles and within school teacher roles to support us in reaching the goals we have set for ourselves in raising achievement for our students across the ECEs, primary schools and secondary school in the Community of Learning. Our achievement challenges are as follows:

Challenge 1: Raise achievement in Writing for students currently working below or well below the expected curriculum level, specifically targeting boys and all students at transition points as they progress through the curriculum levels.

Challenge 2: Raise achievement in Science for students in Years 4 -10 who are achieving below or well below the national expected norms in the NZCER tool Science: Thinking with Evidence, specifically targeting boy progress.

Challenge 3: To increase the exposure and understanding of learning a second language and its impact and importance for the NZ economy.

We are committed to smooth transitions from ECE to primary school and to secondary school, and have a process target to ensure this is a focus for the Kāhui Ako: Strengthen the pathway from ECE through to Tertiary with greater effective Kāhui Ako collaboration and considered transition programmes.

The principals recently attended a retreat to begin the development of the across school teacher roles. The across school teachers will work across the schools to support our vision of having an engaged community of successful learners.

MOE Property Business Case Review

This review has commenced, and as a result representatives of the MOE and their appointed contractors have made several visits to our site. The objective of the MOE Business Case is to establish a viable option for redevelopment of the school and associated costs. This is highly likely to be a staged project, over a number of years – encompassing demolition, new builds and repairs/refurbishments with significant upgrades to site infrastructure. The funding will also be staged over different MOE financial years which end on June 30th. There is no design, final staging/decanting determined as part of the Business Case – it remains high level – however the MOE will ensure that it is practical and that delivery is achievable and we will work closely with them in this regard.

The MOE has provided the school with a summary of the objectives and the timing of the review in 2018, and we will be working with the MOE Property Team to achieve the best outcome for the school.






Classics Trip 2018 Greece and Italy

LACK of SLEEP - one of the biggest issues that affects young people

Teachers and parents often comment to us about young people being tired. We know that lack of sleep affects mood and a depressed mood can lead to lack of sleep. If necessary, change this cycle and ensure that your young person gets the recommended 9+ hours sleep a night. Lack of sleep also affects concentration, learning and behaviour.

At least one hour before sleep give the body and brain signals to calm down. Set up a routine

- remove all electronic devices (cell phones, computers, tablets) from the bedroom, the light interferes with the sleep hormone, melatonin
- have a warm bath or shower, read
- no caffeine drinks after lunch, if at all
- make sure the room is cool, quiet and dark
- get bright light in the morning, avoid it in the evening

Parents/caregivers need to make the rules. You are welcome to contact us if you are concerned, or contact your GP if you think there may be underlying reasons why your teen does not sleep well. Some young people use sleep drops or melatonin from the chemist or Health Food shop to break the cycle of not sleeping.

DTP301 Trip to Industry

On the 29th March 2018 the DTP301 class went on a trip to Orion Health to learn about the company and how they work, along with their project management method of Scrum. We did an activity based around Scrum, where we had to build a Lego house to set primary and secondary specifications. We had to work as a team to plan a two-story house to fit as many specifications as possible and then had a limited amount of time to complete sprints of work. The challenge in this was prioritizing and setting work, but also building in such a way that parts could be changed or altered when the client decided so. This activity was good in teaching us about Scrum and how in the real world things can change and we have to be prepared. I think something that could be improved is to have longer to plan and have more sprints so that we could complete the project fully, and actually have a more solid and less rushed plan that would allow everyone to have set work, and the time it would take to complete each task, just like how Scrum is actually used.

We also learnt about how Orion implement Scrum in their everyday work and projects, it was very helpful to see how they do it and why, especially how they estimate the time each task will take and how even this can be inaccurate, but it is fixable. We were then taken on a tour around their facility and we were able to see a real working programming environment. It was interesting to see how many other parts to a project there are, not just the programmers and development team. Overall, it was an enjoyable and educational trip that helped many of us learn more about what a possible future in Software Development could be like.







The Consul for Education, from the Chinese Consulate in Christchurch, Mr. Jianjun ZHAI; the Deputy Director from CIUC, Dr. Janet (Qianhua) YU; the China trip coordinator, Chelsea Cheng, Mrs Terina Yee, Mr George Elliott, students from the trip and their parents, Mrs Rachel Austen and Mrs Kathy Paterson, Lincoln High School Principal, were present for the evening.

Mrs Kathy Paterson opened the evening with a warm welcoming speech to the guests, families and students. The master of ceremony for the evening was Nikita Smith who managed the programme well. Each student came forward and presented their personal views on different aspects of this once in a life time trip to China, while a continuous slide show provided a backdrop to their commentaries. We were most impressed with Nikita's natural ability to make comments after each presentation in both Chinese and in English.

Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the evening and they were so grateful that their child had the opportunity to go on this cultural exchange. Mr George Elliott talked about his first visit to China and how he was happy to see modern China. He spoke about the Chinese people's ability to preserve the country's cultural heritage. Chinese people were so kind to us wherever we travelled. Before the evening closed, Mr Zhai spoke. He commented that he was honoured to be invited to hear students' views on China and was impressed by the enthusiasm with which the students spoke about his homeland. He would like to invite New Zealand students to see China again and learn more about its language and culture. Lastly, the group sang "Molihua-the Jasmine Flowers", a traditional song they had learned in China.


