

In Year 10 students have opportunities to obtain NCEA Literacy and Numeracy. These Literacy and Numeracy assessments are digital exams that are set by NZQA at speci Writing (worth 5 credits each). Numeracy (worth 10 credits) involves one exam only. further opportunities in Year 11 and beyond.

NCEA Changes as of 2024

Lincoln High School Te Kura Tuarua o Waihora

Strengthening NCEA by making a series of changes to improve wellbeing, equity, coherence, pathways and credibility. Changes led by the MOE and implemented by NZQA who administer NCEA.

- 1. <u>Make NCEA more accessible</u>
- 2. Equal status for mātauranga Māori in NCEA
- 3. Strengthen literacy and numeracy requirements & assessments
- 4. Fewer, larger standards
- 5. <u>Simplify NCEA's structure</u>
- 6. <u>Clearer pathways to further education or work</u>
- 7. Keep NCEA Level 1 optional

Implementation

The new NCEA Level 1 will be fully implemented nationally in 2024 Level 2 will be implemented in 2026 and Level 3 in 2027 – note: LHS does do Level 1 NCEA

- From <u>2024 the Literacy and Numeracy</u> standards will become a <u>mandatory corequisite</u> to the NCEA qualification. 2023 will be a transitional year.
- . i.e. to gain NCEA Level 1, 2 or 3 you need to have also gained literacy and numeracy.





What is NCEA Numeracy?

Numeracy in NCEA is the ability to understand and use mathematics and statistics in daily life, at home, at school (in all subjects not just Mathematics), and at work. Numeracy is important because it is everywhere.

Numeracy - "real world" scenarios involving:

- 1. Operations on number
- 2. Mathematical relationships
- 3. Spatial properties and representations (of shapes)
- 4. Location and navigation
- 5. Measurement
- 6. Statistics and data
- 7. Elements of chance (probability)

What is NCEA Literacy?



Having literacy is about being able to read, write and speak effectively to communicate ideas and knowledge.


<u>Reading</u> – understand ideas and information in written texts in books or articles, textbooks with language and pictures, texts and images on websites, messages in social media, and so on.

<u>Writing</u> – write texts to communicate information and ideas, using language in a way that the audience can understand, and that suits the purpose of the text you want to write.

<u>Examples of</u> <u>Literacy</u>







Literacy standards = upper level 4 & lower level 5 of the English NZ Curriculum

Numeracy standard = upper level 4 and lower level 5 of the Mathematics and Statistics NZ Curriculum.



The Literacy and Numeracy Standards

1) <u>Numeracy</u> – US 32406: Use mathematics and statistics to meet the numeracy demands of a range of situations (10 credits)


2) <u>Literacy</u>:

- Reading US32403: Read written texts to understand ideas & information (5 credits)
- Writing US32405: Write texts to communicate ideas and information (5 credits)

How Can Students Prepare for the Digital Exams?

1) Numeracy:

- Year 10 and Year 11 Maths courses
- Microsoft Teams
- Homework Group after school on Thursday's
- NZQA past digital exams

2) Literacy:

- Year 10 and Year 11 English courses
- Homework Group after school on Thursday's
- NZQA past digital exams


Note: If a student does not achieve the Numeracy, Literacy – reading and/or writing, then they can redo the digital exam in Yr 11 onwards until they do pass these assessments.


Numeracy work - Microsoft Teams – Year 11 students in the 11 MNU course



How can parents support their student with Numeracy?

- Ask your student to show you what they are working on, especially in Microsoft Teams
- 2. Get them to check for any related notes
- 3. Do "real world maths" with them in your daily life: e.g.
 - Estimating and then measuring things
 - Reading timetables and charts
 - What time should we leave to get there by....?
 - Am I better buying 4 x 2.25L of coke or 6 x 1.5 L?
 - How much would 3 packets of ... cost me?
 - What's the discounted price with 20% off this?
 (and make sure they round money to the nearest 1 cent)

How can parents support their student with Literacy?

- Lincoln High School
- 1. Proofread student's work e.g. ask your student to write an email and a letter, using a formal tone, and proofread it. Check spelling and grammar including full stops and sentences starting with capital letters.
- 2. Get students to practice writing a formal letter e.g. a covering letter for a part-time job application.
- 3. If a student comes across an unfamiliar word, ask them what it could mean by looking at the context of the writing i.e. use the context to work out the meaning, instead of telling them the meaning.
- 4. Remember, literacy includes reading and writing so we want to support our students with both.
- 5. Point out appropriate wording for a written piece e.g. the wording for social media messaging is not appropriate for a letter, or how words can influence a reader.

The Digital Exams

- Approximately 60 minutes long
- Students work on their own device (not phones)
- Exams occur in classrooms
- Exam conditions apply
- Reader/writer support provided for those eligible
- Physical and digital supervisors
- The whole country sits the same exams on the same day
- Results (Achieved or Not Achieved) released
 approximately 6-8 weeks later by NZQA
- Results will be imported into Kamar. Available of the Kamar portal

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
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
